A NOTE FROM THE PROSECUTOR



Fall is a busy season here in the Prosecutor's Office, from Child Support Awareness Month, to Senior Safety Month, to our annual Responding to the Needs of Victims Conference, and expungement clinics for both juvenile and adult offenders. My office is working hard to serve Summit County by providing education and resources for law enforcement, victim advocates, first responders, survivors and their families, and all Summit County residents.

Whether you are looking for more information on Ohio's constitutional carry laws, self-defense skills to protect yourself, how to seal the record of an old mistake you made in the past, or tips to help you and your family stay safe from scams, my office is here to help.

We are also committed to promoting the rights of victims and survivors of crime. Our Responding to the Needs of Victims Conference – which is in its 10^{th} year – is a training we provide each year for professionals from a range of backgrounds to learn how they can better support the victims and survivors they serve. This year's conference, "Practical Guidance for Marsy's Law," focused on helping professionals identify the current legal requirements (including the utilization of the Victims' Rights Request Form) when serving victims, common difficulties with implementation, lessons learned, and best practices to protect victims' rights at each stage of the judicial process.

The passage of Marsy's Law and subsequent implementing legislation—House Bill 343—increased the number of crime victims who have constitutional rights. Marsy's Law instituted additional mandates on various actors in the justice system, including law enforcement, courts, probation and parole offices, and prosecutors. Our conference seeks to help all members of the justice system navigate these new rules.

OHIO TAX RETURNS

Some Ohioans have been receiving texts claiming that their tax refund claim has been processed, and to go to a link to put in their bank information to receive their refund. The text also claims that if you don't submit the required payment information on time, you will forfeit your refund.

Do NOT click on any links in these texts or provide any sort of payment information. The Ohio Department of Taxation ("ODT") has confirmed that it does NOT send text messages about tax matters or request payment or payment information through text.

Taxpayers who receive a suspicious text from ODT are urged to contact the department directly by calling, sending an official message, or making an in-person visit. If you're unsure about a message, contact ODT directly through their official channels.

"FREE" GIFTS

A new phishing tactic scammers are using is sending fake promotional emails that appear to be from a reputable brand. The email claims that if you fill out a survey and pay a small shipping fee at a provided link, you will receive a free gift. However, the link is fake, and the gift doesn't exist. The "small" shipping fee is just a cover to steal your financial information, or even your identity.

Legitimate organizations won't ask for your credit card details to cover shipping for a completely free promotional item. If you're unsure about a message, go to the organization's official website or give them a call at a trusted number to check if the offer is real. Do NOT use any contact information provided in the email.




NEWS FROM OUR FACILITY DOG



TOP COP: Officer Taylor Paxton Stow Police Department



Officer Taylor Paxton was nominated by Assistant Prosecutor Mackenzie Godwin for her outstanding work in a theft and credit card fraud case. Officer Paxton pursued multiple leads, visiting five different locations and speaking with various witnesses to detail the defendant's actions. She also spoke with the defendant's family members, checked prior incidents the defendant was involved in, and eventually figured out the defendant's license plate number. She then searched Flock cameras and located the defendant's vehicle at every location where the victim's credit card was used. Her report was incredibly detailed, yet concise and easy to follow.



Officer Paxton's thorough and dedicated work provided the Prosecutor's Office with everything needed to prosecute the case, and her efforts were described as "above and beyond."

TOP COP: Detective Edward Hornacek Akron Police Department



Detective Ed Hornacek was nominated by Assistant Prosecutor Jamila Mitchell for his investigative work into the tragic death of Paige Calich in July of 2024. From the onset of the case, Detective Hornacek worked quickly to investigate all possible leads. He reviewed hours of body camera footage, identified potential witnesses, issued subpoenas, executed search warrants, and reviewed all digital evidence in the case. His diligent and efficient work led to suspects being identified within hours of the murder, and captured within days.



Detective Hornacek promptly responds to every email, returns every phone call, attends every meeting, and will always follow through on anything that is requested of him. His work ethic is unrivaled, and he has brought closure to many families that have been impacted by crime. His work investigating the death of Paige Calich was instrumental in putting the offenders behind bars and making Akron safer.

RESPONDING TO THE NEEDS OF DOMESTIC VIOLENCE SURVIVORS



Domestic violence remains a critical public safety and public health issue throughout Ohio, and Summit County is no exception. Survivors and their families face complex challenges that intersect with housing instability, child welfare, mental health, and the justice system. In response, agencies across our region, including Hope & Healing Survivor Resource Center, ACCESS, Inc., and Victim Assistance Program, work tirelessly to provide services, support, and advocacy to survivors of domestic and sexual violence.

This fall, the Summit County Prosecutor's Office hosted its 10th Annual Responding to the Needs of Victims Conference, bringing together professionals across law enforcement, legal services, advocacy, and social work to deepen their understanding of Marsy's Law and other key legal protections. This article highlights recent statistics, community resources, and ongoing efforts to respond to the needs of victims in equitable, trauma-informed, and culturally responsive ways.

Recent Data & Key Statistics

Economic Cost of Intimate Partner Violence in Ohio

- Estimated annual cost: Nearly \$1.2 billion
- Major components:
 - Physical health care: ~\$264.8 million (~22.9%)
 - Loss of life: ~\$239.9 million (~20.8%)
 - Lost worker productivity: ~\$227.7 million (~19.7%)

Fatalities (July 1, 2023 - June 30, 2024)

- 114 intimate partner-related fatalities recorded
- Among the deceased:
 - At least 79 minor children lost a parent
 - 51 children lost a grandparent
 - 33 children were present during the fatal incidents

RESPONDING TO THE NEEDS OF DOMESTIC VIOLENCE SURVIVORS

Housing & Homelessness

- In 2023, Ohio Domestic Violence Network's Relocation & Safety Assistance Program:
 - Supported 699 adult survivors and 928 children
 - Assistance included rent, deposits, utilities, and moving costs
 - Total funds distributed: Over \$551,600
 - Most recipients were women, and the majority had children

- REACH Rapid Rehousing Program (2023):
 - Provided short-term rental assistance to
 928 survivors
 - Support splits nearly evenly between adults and children
- Student Homelessness 2023–2024 School Year (ACCESS, Inc.)
 - Among Ohio students experiencing homelessness:
 - 1 in 2 were chronically absent
 - There was a 33% increase in student homelessness compared to recent years

Although difficult, these statistics are vital in understanding lived experiences, and where gaps in domestic violence prevention and assistance services persist. Summit County has a strong foundation through agencies, advocates, and legal protections. Through collaboration, we can work toward a community where survivors are not only supported, but validated, empowered, and made whole. Together, we can forge a response system that truly centers on the needs of survivors.


Key Agencies & Local Resources in Summit County

- <u>Hope & Healing Survivor Resource Center 24/7 Hotline: (330) 374-1111</u>
 - Serves Summit and Medina Counties. Offers free, confidential services, including emergency shelter, counseling, court advocacy, support groups, crisis hotlines, and outreach/education.
- <u>Victim Assistance Program 24/7 Hotline: (330) 376-0040</u>
 - Provides crisis intervention, legal and court assistance, safety planning, and support for children who witness violence; connects survivors with resources.
- ACCESS, Inc. 24/7 Shelter Assistance Hotline: 2-1-1
 - Focuses on emergency shelter for women and children, support with educational access, essential services, and long-term stability. Their recent reports highlight the pronounced need in our community.

The Summit County Prosecutor's Office's Ambassadors for Equity and Social Justice bring together coworkers from different backgrounds and cultures, and foster education and engagement to make the community a better place.
